

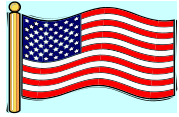

## President's Message

Last month I mentioned that Novalis offers new for 2007 'Lemon Daddy' hydrangea with chartreuse leaves. They also offer Double Knock Out Rose. It has cherry-red double blooms against luxuriant green foliage from early June to Frost. No fear for black spot or pests. It's a brute against humidity and drought. Hardy in the face of winter and aggressive in partial shade. Its time to start our spring work on projects supported by the Master Gardeners. Last year the projects were very well maintained. Let's keep it up this year as well. Select a project – sign up – get involved.

My battle with the deer in our neighborhood continues. They seem to enjoy many of the same plants that I enjoy. I am always seeking deer-resistant plants. This year at the Nashville Lawn and Garden Show, I purchased a product called Deer Fortress. It is in a canister with a ground stake (or it can be suspended from tree limbs). Each canister is advertised to last all season. Thus far the deer haven't eaten my hostas. The product is manufactured by Repelt LLC, 222 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue, Suite 299, Cedar Rapids, IA 52401 ([www.deerfortress.com](http://www.deerfortress.com)).

Ground covers can be important in our plantings. Five good ground covers for the sun are: (1) Lambs' ear (2) Saponaria (3) Saxifrage (4) Sedums and (5) Snow-in-summer (Cerastium tomentosum). Five good ground covers for the shade are: (1) Bugleweed (2) Lily-of-the-valley can be invasive (3) Scented cranesbill – deer resistant (4) Speedweel and (5) Sweet woodruff – will cover large areas.

### MARCH PROGRAM: Landscape Design, Jamey Pendergrass

Jamey Pendergrass, horticulturist with the 'Plant Ranch' in Dickson and a speaker at the recent Nashville Lawn and Garden Show, gave an overview of the basic principles of landscaping design. Specific specimens were recommended for highlight plants, backdrop/filler plants and border plants to balance a landscape. Prior to beginning a design, the **ph** of the soil should be checked and the location and duration of the sunlight observed in that area. Software is now available to illustrate how a plant will look in an individual yard a few years after planting. The 'Plant Ranch' provides free landscaping design services.

### Tips for Fire Blight Control During Bloom

The bloom period is a key time for fire blight management in apple and pear. It is during bloom that the most damaging of the fire blight infections take place. It is also the time at which streptomycin (Agri-mycin, Firewall, Streptrol) sprays are most effective . . . in fact, we no longer recommend streptomycin after bloom (unless there is a hailstorm) because of its lack of effectiveness against the shoot blight phase. The following points should help you to use streptomycin efficiently.

- Streptomycin works best when applied alone (not tank mixed with fungicides), under slow-drying conditions. The addition of a surfactant may improve its effectiveness.
- Streptomycin only protects open blossoms. Those that are not yet open need to be sprayed when they open. It is for this reason that sprays must be applied every 3 to 5 days during bloom, unless you are using the MaryBlyt program to guide you.
- Only fire blight-susceptible varieties need to be sprayed with streptomycin. This differs from the strategy for the use of delayed dormant copper sprays. Copper should be sprayed on all blocks in the orchard, because the objective is to kill epiphytic (on plant surface) fire blight bacteria. These can occur and multiply on the surface of any tree, resistant or susceptible. For a bacterium to infect a blossom and cause disease, however, the variety must be susceptible. Streptomycin is used to protect blossoms from infection, not to kill epiphytic bacteria.
- Streptomycin is most effective when applied the day before, or the day of, an infection. However, if you miss an infection period, you can still obtain some benefit. Streptomycin applied up to 48 hours after infection is better than no treatment. (SB)

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### Early-Season Apple Fungicide Sprays

Although this has not been a spring for diseases, we shouldn't let our guard down on scab control. **Scab** needs to be treated early to prevent primary scab infections and thus break the disease cycle. Also, it is important to avoid early infections on sepals (calyx), as these are difficult to detect and can provide secondary inoculum throughout the early part of the growing season.

There are several different strategies for scheduling scab sprays. The selection of a spray program (what fungicide to use and how often) depends on factors such as other disease organisms present and the ability to obtain good coverage of the trees with the sprays. If cedar-apple rust or powdery mildew are a threat, it is probably best to control scab with a sterol-inhibiting fungicide (Nova, Procure, or Rubigan), because control of all three diseases would be obtained. Tank mixing with mancozeb or captan would improve the protectant ability and discourage the development of resistance to the sterol inhibitor (SI). Do not use captan within 2 weeks of an oil spray.

The 3- to 4-day curative activity of the SI fungicides makes them useful at tight cluster in case some scab infections occurred prior to that time. The SI/protectant combination allows you to space the applications 7 to 10 days apart.

Where **cedar-apple rust** is a problem, mancozeb or ziram should be used as the protectant, to be mixed with the SI. The strobilurin fungicides Flint and Sovran can be used in lieu of the SI's, but I recommend reserving these materials for use during the summer. They may only be applied 4 times per year, and they play a more valuable role during the summer than during the spring.

Conditions have been unfavorable for **powdery mildew** thus far, but that could change. Apple powdery mildew is favored by cool, wet weather. (SB)
